Territorial Acknowledgment and Announcements

Rev. Joanne's Reflection

Happy Pride Sunday!

All month, cities, towns and villages across the country are celebrating the talents and contributions of those who identify as part 2S LGBTQ + community, as well as recognizing the resilience of those whose very lives had for many years basically been criminalized.

From the Government of Canada website: Historically, Pride gatherings emerged from the first large-scale protests for 2SLGBTQI+ rights. In Canada, the first demonstrations took place in Ottawa and Vancouver in 1971. By 1973, Pride events were held in several Canadian cities, including Montréal, Ottawa, Saskatoon, Toronto, Vancouver and Winnipeg. Toronto's Pride weekend in June is now among the largest Pride events in North America.

The United Church of Canada made a bold but controversial decision in 1988, with the result that the General Council declared that "all persons, regardless of sexual orientation, who profess their faith in Jesus Christ are welcome to be or become members of The United Church of Canada" and that "all members of the United Church are eligible to be considered for ordered ministry." It was another twenty years before the church affirmed the participation and ministry of transgender people, and it was not until 2010 that Rev. Cindy Bourgeois, is the first openly transgender person to be ordained in the United Church.

As a denomination, these are all milestones of which we can be proud – a reason to bring that rainbow sign of hope into our churches and sanctuaries, a reason to wear or wave a Pride flag or symbol. In

1982, the organization now known as Affirm United began, originally as support for individual gay and lesbian members of the church, and it continues today, largely seen through the Affirming Ministries program, of which this congregation became a part in 2014.

We declare, in our decision to become an Affirming congregation, that we stand with the United Church in the belief that "gender and sexuality are gifts of God, and that all persons are made in the image of God. We welcome into full membership and ministry people of all sexual orientations and gender identities. The United Church is opposed to discrimination against any person on any basis by which a person is devalued." When we fly our progress Pride flag we say welcome, when we paint a rainbow on our driveway, we say "you belong", when we choose inclusive language in our worship services, we say "you are included", when we change the signage on our washrooms, we say "all are valued."

It has been a long road to this place of celebrating Pride, a long road that still continues, because there are many in our community who are still vulnerable, still do not feel safe to live their authentic lives openly. Not all of those individuals will come to our church, not all would even identify as Christian, but our flags, our presence at community events as an Affirming church, our rainbows, can be a sign of hope, a sign that despite a rise in hate-motivated crime against the 2sLGBTQ+ community and people, there is a space in which they are named as God's beloved, as important and valuable and precious just as they are.

It has been a long road since Jesus declared to his disciples that what had been hidden will be revealed, that what had been kept in secret – like sexual orientation, gender identity, and God's acceptance and love for all – should now be shouted from the rooftops. As allies, as the friends and supporters we declare ourselves to be, we need to keep shouting, keep reminding ourselves and others of the worth of ALL people, the need for justice for ALL God's beloved children.

So this Pride Sunday, lets wear or wave our flags – not just here, but as we walk through the grocery store, or gather to clean up a section of Cawthra Road, or visit a friend. Show our Pride in the hopes that even one person feels a little less afraid, a little more accepted, a little more able to live as God intended them to live.

That would surely be something to be proud of – our actions making a difference for others in the world.
