Rev Joanne's Reflection

It's the traveling time of year, when families pack up for vacations, trips or just a day away at a park or beach. I remember well preparing for even one day away with four children – snacks, strollers, drinks and diapers, each parents with a backpack, sometimes the older kids also laden with bags of one sort or another. I also remember what a joy it was, as my daughter and three sons grew, to be able to head out for a day's adventure without all those extra burdens.

I'm sure that those aren't the kinds of burdens that Jesus is talking about in this passage from the gospel of Matthew assigned for this week. In the first century of ancient Jerusalem, there were many burdens that Jesus' audience would have carried. There was the yoke of occupation by the Romans, with extra layers of taxes and laws, there was the yoke of Jewish laws, which could restrict lives and left many on the margins, there was the burden of simply trying to provide enough food and shelter for families in a time when there was not plentiful resources. Of course there would also have been the very human burdens of worry and illness and injustice that are very much still a part of our lives today.

Our passage begins as Jesus describes the community that he sees – children whose music is not understood, whose tune is not heard, a community that does not react as it should. John was described as possessed because he lived an ascetic life and spoke both fiercely and unwaveringly about our need for redemption. Jesus lived a very different life, and spoke in a different way, but he is still called a glutton and a drunkard because he ate and drank and connected with those who carried some of the heaviest burdens that their society could hang upon them.

I'm sure there were those in the crowd that day that had heard those descriptions of both John the Baptist and Jesus, themselves. Perhaps they were overheard in the marketplace or while traveling the

roads, perhaps even as they gathered at the synagogue for worship. Here Jesus gives them the opportunity to be honest with themselves – were they like the children, calling out when the responses they encountered were not what was expected? Were they like those who could not hear the messages that John or Jesus brought to them? Were they pipers, were they singers? Were they the ones who refused to react?

How about our churches – and our own lives, today? Are we the ones who call people into the dance of faith? Are we the ones with whom others can feel safe to bring their worries, their fears, their losses, their burdens? Or are we standing on the sidelines, not getting too involved, and ready to judge others without looking too closely at the message they might actually be bringing us? For centuries members of the 2SLGBTQ+ were not openly welcomed in our churches, or openly given roles as religious leaders, neither were women. Their unique perspectives and insights are still not welcome in all places of worship, and yet they add so much to our understanding of a loving and just God.

I think it is important that we see Jesus so quickly shift from these parable-like teaching comparisons to prayer. I believe it is an important reminder that no matter how we speak, or what the topic, God is close at hand. When we call out the hypocrisies around us, God is present, when we seek to help others to understand God's way, God is nearby. I also think it is important for us to see just how naturally and easily Jesus turns his attention to praising God, to being in conversation with the One he knows intimately, and who knows him in the same way. Jesus offers us that same relationship with God, that same path to knowing and being known.

What will be the result of such relationship? Rest, a laying down of burdens, a chance to step aside from what weighs us down. Such wonderful words of comfort and care and hope - "Come to me, all you who labour and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest." Words offered not to the powerful and influential, not to ones who would not dance or sing or engage with the people, but to those who are truly wearied by the injustices of their world – as in ours. Words offered to those who seek a different way, who seek to have their music of life heard and heeded, those with whom Jesus ate and drank and prayed.

Jesus yoke is love – love for God, love for neighbour. Jesus' burden is relationship with God that can lighten our loads, and make our journeys less cumbersome. Thanks be to God who allows us to lay our troubles down, and seek to travel more lightly, more lovingly, and more justly. Amen
