Rev Joanne's Reflection

Before we begin to reflect together today, I invite us to share a deep breath or two together. With feet planted on the floor, as comfortably as you can, take a slow, deep, breath that completely fills your lungs. Let that breath out – slowly and completely. Take another, perhaps counting to five this time as you inhale and as you exhale.

Air – it surrounds us, it sustains us, filling our lungs with each breath. Without it we cannot survive, without clean air we sicken. It is part of the heavens, the sky, the atmosphere around us, and perhaps we sometimes think of it as empty. But the sky, the atmosphere, the very air we breathe is so very full!

Water is in the sky – clouds and rain, snow and sleet. Do you remember sticking out your tongue to catch a falling snowflake when you were younger? Lights fill the sky – sunlight in the daytime hours, stars planets and moon in the night sky, spectacular rainbows, northern lights, and lightning, and delight our eyes. Birds and other creatures move through the air, huge raptors like bald eagles, large carrion birds like the turkey vultures that live on the Niagara escarpment, small songbirds that fill our gardens, bees that pollinate the plants that grow our food.

The sky is also filled with what we cannot see, but know is present. Molecules of so many things, primarily nitrogen and oxygen, but also trace amounts of argon and helium, carbon dioxide and ozone are part of the air we breathe. Aerosols like pollen and dust are not always visible, but anyone with allergies can tell you they are present! Bio aerosols exist in the sky as well – tiny microbial organisms that actually travel through the atmosphere in breezes and winds, in rain or even in a sneeze.

Sometimes we can smell what is in the air but is unseen – the campfire aroma from wildfires, the unpleasant odours of sulphur or methane, or the fragrances of flowers. Living in an urban area, we often get whiffs of diesel fuel or vehicle exhaust, along with the smell of fresh cut grass or hot asphalt laid to repair our many roads and highways.

Sounds too travel through the atmosphere, some that can be heard for kilometres. Some are pleasant like bird song, some can be irritating like traffic sounds or sirens. Of course music exists in the 'heavens' as well – notes that float, melodies that soar, tunes that can hang in the air after the last chord is struck.

As people of faith, we also know that God's Spirit swirls in and through the sky, in the heavens around us. In the second creation story in Genesis, which we heard today, God's breath – the Spirit of life - created the first human one from simple dirt. The Spirit, as Jesus reminds us, that moves as it will, filling the spaces between our thoughts, between our heartbeats, and between the atoms that make up all of creation. With air and dirt God created humanity, and we spend all of our lives connected to these elements. Air filled with Spirit, with life, with sound and smell and wind and rain, and amazing sights. Dirt filled with life and possibility.

The breath of God – and the air we breathe – has been inhaled and exhaled by creatures of all kinds since life began. It may be composed of slightly different proportions of elements, but the air in the sky today is the same air that dinosaurs breathed, and that early humans breathed, and even that Jesus breathed. When we share together in worship, we share our breath as we sing, as we pray, and as we simply sit together. We perhaps have a different understanding of that shared breath or air since the pandemic. While we recognize that God's Spirit as breath is shared, so can disease be spread.

The past year has certainly reminded us that the air can be vulnerable, and can carry choking smoke, ash, and dust. I spoke recently with my oldest son, who lives on Vancouver Island, and while there are no fires close to his home in this record-breaking wildfire season, the smoke still drifts in, making breathing more difficult, blurry the view of mountains and hills. He told me that the local pharmacist remarked that they were having difficulty keeping breathing medications – puffers – in stock, and were not surprised at all that my son had used three times the usual amount of medication to control his asthma. Even here in Mississauga, our air quality has been affected by fires burning hundreds of kilometres away.

Just like that Spirit that hovered over the waters of all creation, the air and atmosphere that protects us from the cold and vacuum of space is shared with the entire planet. We cannot truly escape the poor air quality in locations like Beijing, or California, or Bangladesh, because there are no barriers between those places and where we call home.

Call to care for creation includes the care of the skies, and perhaps becoming more aware of how our lives and lifestyles affect the sir we all must breathe. Electric vehicles, with lower emissions, help to care for the air. The dismantling of coal-fired electricity plants helped to clean some air. The reduced use of aerosols for personal care and even cooking made an impact. We need to care about our shared atmosphere, we need to care about the air we breathe, and the sky that surrounds us. If we do not, the earth will let us know, as it has already.

We are reminded in our last scripture today that the skies are not separate from God, and God's ways. We are reminded that at the moment of Jesus' death, the earth became dark and still – the heavens themselves marking his death, just as they celebrated his birth with a star in the sky.

Let us do all we can to share breath that is full of Spirit, full of our care and concern, but full of promise for all of God's creation. Amen.
